# Fashion fights cancer

The fight against cancer has never looked so fashionable. On March 23, the Presbyterian Cancer Center and the American Cancer Society hosted the 2nd annual Cure by Design event at the Fillmore. Approximately 350 people celebrated cancer survivorship, bid in auctions, enjoyed a cocktail hour and marveled at the fashion sported by this year's 19 models.

Models ranged in age from eight to 60 and each was a local cancer survivor. The clothing purveyors ranged from Brooks Brothers to Tommy Bahama, and from Coplon's to Peace of Cloth. The clothing selection highlighted, through design, the hope that emanated from these survivors as they strutted down the runway. Jeff Palmer of PPT Photography even took a second lap during his turn in the spotlight, much to the audible delight of the crowd.

"The event started with a designer named Alex Garfield," said Kari Dahlstrom, Regional Director of Marketing Communications for the American Cancer Society South Atlantic Division. "His company now is called Peace of Cloth ... he had been a part of the original event many years ago and brought the event to the American Cancer Society." The guests also welcomed Luis Machicao, a famous designer from Peru who now lives in Rock Hill, S.C.

Machicao says he loves the event because survivors make the best models. "They are survivors," he said. "They know what it means to be able to walk the runway." ■
